Answers:

1. Workers together with him, and to grow in Christ;
2. Paul taught that Christians are to separate from things contrary to God, and he encouraged each individual to understand that they were to not fellowship with, or even participate with, those who live contrary to God's Word (this includes friendships with, or even marriage to, lost people). Christians must recognize that there is no common ground between them and the lost; "for ye are the temple of the living God"; "I will dwell in them, and walk in them, and I will be their God, and they shall be my people";
3. Come out from among them, and be separate, and touch not the unclean thing; God said He will receive you, and will be a Father unto you, and you shall be His sons and daughters;
4. "Cleanse ourselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God";
5. To grow in Christ, becoming a better Christian day by day, year by year; Yes!;
6. By learning the importance of giving, not of necessity, but as unto the Lord. It should be such a part of a Christian's lifestyle that we give without even realizing that we are giving;
7. We are to recognize the lack of Christ in that heart. It is that understanding that is to help us handle each situation the way Jesus would want us to handle them;
8. Satan is very deceiving – for he is "transformed into an angel of light." He knows how to make something look, feel, and even appear right while being completely wrong;
9. Paul taught the importance of constantly doing a self-check to "prove your own selves," to make sure that one's heart and life is consistently pleasing to God and not failing to live for Him in any point;
